

POPULATION EXPLOSION

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1. Meaning of Population Explosion

Population explosion refers to a rapid and sudden increase in the population of a region or country within a short period of time.

It occurs when the **birth rate remains high**, the **death rate falls sharply**, and the **population growth becomes uncontrolled**.

Key Points

- Imbalance between **population size** and **available resources**
 - Usually results from improvements in **medical care, sanitation, and nutrition**, leading to lower mortality
 - More population than the environment or economy can sustain
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2. Causes of Population Explosion

(A) Social Causes

1. **Early marriage**
2. **Preference for large families**
3. **Lack of education**, especially among women
4. **Religious and cultural beliefs** supporting high fertility

(B) Economic Causes

1. **Poverty** – children considered economic assets
2. **Agrarian economy** – children assist in agricultural work
3. **Lack of social security** – people depend on children for support in old age

(C) Health-related Causes

1. **Decline in death rate**
2. **Improved healthcare**, vaccination, and medical facilities
3. **Decreased infant mortality**
4. **Longer life expectancy**

(D) Lack of Awareness & Family Planning

- Limited access to **family planning services**
 - Inadequate **knowledge of contraception**
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3. Consequences / Impact of Population Explosion

(A) Social Impact

- Overcrowding in cities
- Pressure on education and health services
- Rise in unemployment and social unrest
- Lower quality of life

(B) Economic Impact

- High dependency ratio
- Increased pressure on **food, housing, and transport**
- Slow economic development
- Increased poverty levels

(C) Environmental Impact

- Deforestation
- Soil erosion
- Air and water pollution
- Loss of biodiversity
- Overuse of natural resources

(D) Impact on the Education System

- Shortage of teachers
 - Overcrowded classrooms
 - Shortage of teaching–learning materials
 - Difficulty in ensuring quality education

1. Introduction

Population explosion refers to the rapid and excessive growth in the number of people in a region, exceeding the environmental and resource carrying capacity. It is a major socio-economic and environmental issue faced by developing countries.

2. Meaning

A population explosion is a condition where:

- **Birth rate stays high**
- **Death rate decreases sharply**
- **Population grows uncontrolled**

This imbalance leads to pressure on food, land, water, education, and employment.
